### 1. Introduction

Vallejo, with an estimated population of 121,692 as of July 1, 2019 according to the U.S. Census Bureau, is the largest city in Solano County, California, and is located on the northeastern shore of San Pablo Bay. Based on the most recent affordable housing and community development (non-housing) needs data available to the City of Vallejo, the City's Five-Year Consolidated Plan (2020-2024), adopted in 2020, identifies four high priority population groups in Vallejo, in this order of need: (1) extremely low-income and very low-income renters, (2) homeless persons, (3) very low-income and low-income first time homebuyers, and (4) non-homeless persons with special needs, including persons living with HIV/AIDS, severe mental illness, and substance abuse addictions. Community development needs include: (1) completing comprehensive, health and safety public improvements in neighborhood target areas, (2) installing curb ramps, Citywide, and (3) providing social services for extremely low-income and very low-income persons in order to meet their basic human needs.

### 2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

Goals: (1) Construct 75 units of permanent supportive rental housing for homeless persons, (2) establish a Navigation Center for 125 homeless adults, (3) build eleven for-ownership workforce housing units in a neighborhood target area for first time homebuyers, known as "Sonoma Estates", (4) provide critical public services to 125 persons who are not homeless but have special needs, (5) provide social services to 1,250 very low-income and low-income persons, (6) provide direct financial homeownership assistance to five first time homebuyer households, and (7) provide tenant-based rental assistance/rapid rehousing to ten homeless and at-risk of homelessness individuals and families.

### 3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

In 2020, the City adopted a Five-Year Consolidated Plan for the period beginning July 1, 2020 and ending June 30, 2025. Over \$20 million in private, federal, state, and local funds are invested in Consolidated

Plan activities annually; of this amount, a large majority is federal funds. The City is on track to accomplish its Consolidated Plan goals and meet the high priority needs in the community.

### 4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Summary from citizen participation section of plan.

In the first year of the Consolidated Plan (July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021), the City's Housing and Community Development Commission (HCDC) held a public hearing on affordable housing and community development needs on January 7, 2021, in accordance with the City's Citizen Participation Plan. The City holds at least one public hearing each year to receive comments on affordable housing and community development needs in the City of Vallejo. The specific purposes of this annual public hearing are to: (1) determine whether and how affordable housing and community development needs may have changed, significantly, from those identified in the Consolidated Plan and if so what, if any, revisions to proposed projects and activities may be appropriate, and (2) provide an opportunity for residents and other interested parties to comment on how they believe the City's CDBG Program and HOME Program funds may be used in FY 2021-22, which will be the second year of the Five-Year Consolidated Plan. However, the purpose of this hearing is not to recommend the allocation of funding to projects and activities. A legal notice regarding the January 7, 2021 public hearing was published in the local newspaper, and on the City's website, prior to the hearing. Written comments were also invited from the public prior to the public hearing.

The HCDC will hold a second public hearing on May 6, 2021 to receive comments from the public on the draft FY 2021-22 Annual Action Plan.

### 5. Summary of public comments

### 1. Introduction

The City of Vallejo's Office of the City Manager, Housing and Community Development (HCD) Division, will take the lead in implementing its affordable housing and community development strategy for Vallejo in FY 2021-22, (July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022). The HCD Division is responsible for delivering the City's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program, HOME Investment Partnerships Program, and Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP), as well as Vallejo Housing Authority (VHA) Housing Successor Agency (formerly Redevelopment Agency) projects. Affordable housing projects and developments are completed through partnerships with non-profit and for-profit housing developers.

Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction's activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(I))

City employees in the HCD Division will staff the VHA, which administers the Housing Choice Voucher, Project Based Voucher, Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS), Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH), and Section 8 Homeownership Programs. The City will contract with Community Housing Development Corporation (CHDC), a non-profit agency, and which is also a HOME Program-eligible CHDO, to deliver the City's First Time Homebuyer Assistance Program, using CDBG Program and HOME Program funds. CHDC is also certified by HUD as a housing counseling agency, and provides homebuyer educations and housing counseling programs to Vallejo residents. The VHA and social service agency partners will share and target supportive services where possible on behalf of its FSS Program participants.

In January 2021, non-profit housing and social service agencies were invited to submit CDBG Program and HOME Program funding proposals to the City, to address the high priority affordable housing and community development needs in Vallejo, as identified in the Consolidated Plan. The HCDC, an advisory body appointed by the City Council, provided significant input into how these funds will be allocated in FY 2021-22.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

The City's HCD Program Manager sits on (1) the Continuum of Care (CoC) Board for Solano County (Housing First Solano), and (2) the governing board of the Community Action Partnership of Solano (CAP Solano), a Joint Powers Authority (JPA), to support Vallejo's ongoing work to address homeless and safety net service needs. The City will work with Housing First Solano and CAP Solano to develop

programs and supportive services to maintain a seamless continuum of care for the homeless. City staff will provide technical assistance where necessary and appropriate to the CoC Board and the JPA to strengthen capacities, identify and secure resources, and to assist service agencies to access resources, to carry out the activities proposed in the FY 2021-22 Annual Action Plan.

Each year, CAP Solano receives housing project proposals for the homeless, including for permanent housing, transitional housing, and supportive services. The HUD Supportive Housing Program funds many of these activities on a competitive and then ongoing basis. For the last several years, the County of Solano, more recently with assistance from HomeBase, has been successful in securing funding from HUD, the State, and private sources for Homeless Assistance Centers, transitional housing projects, supportive services, and permanent housing units. The City of Vallejo has been an active and participating member of the County of Solano CoC since its inception, and the HCD Program Manager sits on the CoC board. This participation informs the City's choice of priority needs and funding allocations.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City will establish a public facility to be used as a Navigation Center to assess and address the needs of homeless adults. The City will also continue its implementation of "Project Roomkey", utilizing CDBG-CV3 funds.

### Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City will provide CDBG Program funds in FY 2021-22 to The House of Acts, which provides sober living residency for adult men and adult women on parole. The Navigation Center, when completed, will include shelter services for homeless, unsheltered adults.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City will continue its support in FY 2021-22 of the construction of 75 rental units of permanent supportive housing for homeless individuals through existing Loan Agreements with Eden Housing, Inc., dba Vallejo PSH, LP.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

The City and the VHA will coordinate services and referrals with Fighting Back Partnership through its

Family Resource Centers, as well as the Global Center for Success, which provide supportive services to homeless persons; and will provide an allocation of CDBG Program funds to The House of Acts.

### Discussion

The City will address the needs of homeless persons, especially unsheltered adults, with permanent supportive housing and navigation services.

### AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

### Introduction:

The City of Vallejo Housing Element, for the period 2015-23, states that the City's land use controls offer limited options for the construction of affordable housing. However, the City controls where housing may be constructed. The City may allow density bonuses for the provision of affordable housing units for families and individuals, and for senior housing units.

A Housing Strategy for all income groups in Vallejo was adopted by the City Council in 2020, which includes a strategy for addressing the need for additional affordable housing, and expanding resources for the homeless population.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

The cost of public facility improvements will be supported by the City's CDBG Program and other (inkind) funds, to construct and open a Navigation Center for homeless adults. The City will partner with a non-profit agency, using its CDBG Program and HOME Program funds, to expand housing choice opportunities City-wide for very-low and low-income first time homebuyers. The City will provide expedited California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) review for larger housing projects within a Specific Plan Area. The State of California Senate Bill 35 (SB35) review and approval process may also be used for affordable housing projects, such as "Sonoma Estates".

### Discussion:

In FY 2021-22, the City will provide support for first time homebuyers, the preservation and rehabilitation of the existing housing stock, and navigation services for homeless adults.

## AP-85 Other Actions - 91.220(k)

### Introduction:

### Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

The primary obstacle to meeting underserved needs is related to a lack of sufficient funding to implement activities that are needed, and to expand needed programs. Therefore, no actions are planned in this area.

### Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

Using a variety of funding sources, in FY 2021-22 the City will continue to seek opportunities to establish increased affordable rental housing, the preservation of the existing housing stock through physical rehabilitation of properties, and support homeownership for qualified first time homebuyer households.

### Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

Lead-based paint hazard educational materials, inspections, and referrals when necessary will be made available to VHA-assisted Housing Choice Voucher holders, as well as VHA participating and prospective rental housing owners, and to prospective first time homebuyer, housing rehabilitation, and paint grant recipients.

### Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The City recognizes the need to prioritize anti-poverty efforts, and will continue to support existing programs in FY 2021-22. Family self-sufficiency programs with supportive services will continue to be a key component of the City's anti-poverty strategy. Coordination with social service agencies that administer programs such as Child Start, assistance to families in crisis, and other social services will be necessary to prevent a duplication of effort, and to ensure a maximum of opportunities for extremely low-income and very low-income persons, (at 0 to 50 percent AMI). The City will continue to facilitate projects to meet community needs, which may help to reduce the number of households in Vallejo living in poverty.

### Actions planned to develop institutional structure

To carry out the FY 2021-22 Annual Action Plan, the City has an existing institutional structure that is well-developed and strong, through a network of government agencies, non-profit organizations, and

private organizations.

## Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

A total of over \$6.2 million over a three-year period has been committed by three different health care providers to support the operating costs of a Navigation Center for homeless adults when it is completed.

### Discussion:

The City has been successful in leveraging funds from health care partners to address the needs of unsheltered homeless adults. The City will also support social service providers with its CDBG Program funds that work to reduce the number of households living in poverty.
