Attached you will find a district map for consideration that is from the perspective of the African American community of Vallejo. The African American community is spread out and diverse in Vallejo and our collective interest include equal and equitable access to economic development, education, housing, county services and public safety.

Each of the six Districts that we created all touch I-80 and are in close proximity to heavily populated/traveled streets and interstate highways in Vallejo such as I-37, I-29, Sonoma Blvd. Broadway St, Springs Rd and I-780.
