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**Purpose.** The 5-Year and Annual PHA Plans provide a ready source for interested parties to locate basic PHA policies, rules, and requirements concerning the PHA's operations, programs, and services, including changes to these policies, and informs HUD, families served by the PHA, and members of the public of the PHA's mission, goals and objectives for serving the needs of low- income, very low- income, and extremely low- income families

**Applicability.** The Form HUD-50075-HCV is to be completed annually by **HCV-Only PHAs**. PHAs that meet the definition of a Standard PHA, Troubled PHA, High Performer PHA, Small PHA, or Qualified PHA do not need to submit this form. Where applicable, separate Annual PHA Plan forms are available for each of these types of PHAs.

**Definitions.**

- (1) **High-Performer PHA** – A PHA that owns or manages more than 550 combined public housing units and housing choice vouchers, and was designated as a high performer on both the most recent Public Housing Assessment System (PHAS) and Section Eight Management Assessment Program (SEMAP) assessments if administering both programs, or PHAS if only administering public housing.
- (2) **Small PHA** - A PHA that is not designated as PHAS or SEMAP troubled, that owns or manages less than 250 public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceed 550.
- (3) **Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Only PHA** - A PHA that administers more than 550 HCVs, was not designated as troubled in its most recent SEMAP assessment and does not own or manage public housing.
- (4) **Standard PHA** - A PHA that owns or manages 250 or more public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceed 550, and that was designated as a standard performer in the most recent PHAS and SEMAP assessments.
- (5) **Troubled PHA** - A PHA that achieves an overall PHAS or SEMAP score of less than 60 percent.
- (6) **Qualified PHA** - A PHA with 550 or fewer public housing dwelling units and/or housing choice vouchers combined and is not PHAS or SEMAP troubled.

The revisions included organization of the waitlist, leasing in place, and project-based units for the homeless.</p> <p><b>Informal Review and Hearing Procedures.</b> The VHA revised its informal review and hearing procedures to include remote hearings.</p> <p><b>Self Sufficiency Programs and Treatment of Income Changes Resulting from Welfare Program Requirements.</b> HUD approved the VHA's FSS Action Plan in November 2022.</p>
<b>B.2</b>	<p><b>New Activities.</b> – The VHA intends to enter into a HAP Agreement for project-based vouchers for a project that is currently under construction, pending an AHAP. The project is located on Broadway Street in Vallejo. The Broadway Project is a 48-unit Permanent Supportive Housing Program for formerly homeless. The VHA intends to explore opportunities for project basing vouchers either on a competitive or non-competitive basis. This is consistent with the VHA's plan as it expands rental opportunities for voucher holders in the community.</p>
<b>B.3</b>	<p><b>Progress Report.</b></p> <p>Provide a description of the PHA's progress in meeting its Mission and Goals described in its 5-Year PHA Plan.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li><b>Policies that govern eligibility, selection, and admissions were revised regarding the organization of the waitlist, project-based units for homeless, and leasing in place. These revisions were approved to be included in the Administrative Plan in June 2022.</b></li> <li><b>Seventy-four (74) Project-Based Voucher units were committed during FY 2021-22 (July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022). The project is currently nearing completion of construction and has a new target date of April 2023. The VHA opened a waitlist for project-based units in July 2022. Over 1000 applicants were placed on the list. Presently 720 applicants have been screened to fill the units.</b></li> <li><b>Operation and Management: The VHA continues to conduct annual recertifications using methods requiring in-person appointments. Due to the COVID pandemic waning, the VHA has reopened its lobby to the public, made kiosks available, and is conducting in-person voucher briefings.</b></li> <li><b>Informal Review and Hearing Procedures: The VHA implemented in its Administrative Plan procedures to hold informal reviews and hearings through virtual meetings.</b></li> <li><b>The VHA has continued to issue vouchers from the waiting list to assist families with obtaining rental assistance. During the fiscal year beginning in July 2022, 50 vouchers were issued to eligible families.</b></li> <li><b>The VHA has pulled over 500 applicants from the Housing Choice Voucher waiting list and determined eligibility to issue vouchers in March 2023 for eligible families.</b></li> <li><b>The VHA increased the voucher payment standards in June 2022 so that families can reside in diverse neighborhoods.</b></li> <li><b>The VHA was awarded an allocation of ten (10) Fair Share vouchers in August 2022.</b></li> <li><b>The VHA's FSS Action Plan was approved by HUD in November 2022. The VHA continues to administer the FSS Program to 32 active participants. In FY 2022, one (1) participant graduated from the FSS Program.</b></li> <li><b>The VHA has actively participated in the Housing First Solano County Continuum of Care (COC), a coalition of service providers in Solano County working together to end homelessness.</b></li> </ol>

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**Fair Housing Goal:**

**The two housing projects under construction are intended to be 100% Project-Based through Permanent Supportive Housing. Permanent Supportive Housing limits eligibility to homeless or chronically homeless individuals and families. All applicant referrals shall be established and maintained by the Vallejo Housing Authority and/or Solano County's Coordinated Entry System. With respect to the treatment of applicants, VHA, Coordinated Entry, and the management agents will not discriminate against any individual or family because of race, color, creed, national or ethnic origin or ancestry, religion, sex, sexual preference, gender identity, age, disability, handicap, military status, source of income, marital status or presence of children in a household, acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) or AIDS-related conditions (ARC), or any other arbitrary basis.**

**Placement on and selection from the VHA Project-Based waiting list shall be determined by (1) preferences claimed, and (2) the date and time the application was received. VHA shall give preference to unhoused individuals and Vallejo residents who live and/or work within Vallejo city limits.**

**For the 74-unit project, No Place Like Home (NPLH) 23 set-aside units with case management and supportive services will be referred by Coordinated Entry using the Vulnerability Index-Service Prioritization Decision Assistance Tool (VI-SPDAT). Participation in case management and supportive services is voluntary and not a requirement to be eligible for a NPLH unit. NPLH applicants are still subject to VHA eligibility requirements.**

A PHA will be considered in compliance with the certification requirement to affirmatively further fair housing if the PHA fulfills the requirements of §§ 903.7(o)(1) and 903.15(d) and: (i) examines its programs or proposed programs; (ii) identifies any fair housing issues and contributing factors within those programs, in accordance with 24 CFR 5.154; or 24 CFR 5.160(a)(3) as applicable (iii) specifies actions and strategies designed to address contributing factors, related fair housing issues, and goals in the applicable Assessment of Fair Housing consistent with 24 CFR 5.154 in a reasonable manner in view of the resources available; (iv) works with jurisdictions to implement any of the jurisdiction’s initiatives to affirmatively further fair housing that require the PHA’s involvement; (v) operates programs in a manner consistent with any applicable consolidated plan under 24 CFR part 91, and with any order or agreement, to comply with the authorities specified in paragraph (o)(1) of this section; (vi) complies with any contribution or consultation requirement with respect to any applicable AFH, in accordance with 24 CFR 5.150 through 5.180; (vii) maintains records reflecting these analyses, actions, and the results of these actions; and (viii) takes steps acceptable to HUD to remedy known fair housing or civil rights violations, impediments to fair housing choice within those programs; addresses those impediments in a reasonable fashion in view of the resources available; works with the local jurisdiction to implement any of the jurisdiction’s initiatives to affirmatively further fair housing; and assures that the annual plan is consistent with any applicable Consolidated Plan for its jurisdiction. Until such time as the PHA is required to submit an AFH, the PHA will not have to complete section D., nevertheless, the PHA will address its obligation to affirmatively further fair housing in part by fulfilling the requirements at 24 CFR 903.7(o)(3) enacted prior to August 17, 2015, which means that it examines its own programs or proposed programs; identifies any impediments to fair housing choice within those programs; addresses those impediments in a reasonable fashion in view of the resources available; works with local jurisdictions to implement any of the jurisdiction’s initiatives to affirmatively further fair housing that require the PHA’s involvement; and maintain records reflecting these analyses and actions. Furthermore, under Section 5A(d)(15) of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, a PHA must submit a civil rights certification with its Annual PHA Plan, which is described at 24 CFR 903.7(o)(1) except for qualified PHAs who submit the Form HUD-50077-CR as a standalone document.

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This information collection is authorized by Section 511 of the Quality Housing and Work Responsibility Act, which added a new section 5A to the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended, which introduced the Annual PHA Plan. The Annual PHA Plan provides a ready source for interested parties to locate basic PHA policies, rules, and requirements concerning the PHA’s operations, programs, and services, and informs HUD, families served by the PHA, and members of the public for serving the needs of low- income, very low- income, and extremely low- income families.

Public reporting burden for this information collection is estimated to average 6.02 hour per response, including the time for reviewing instructions, searching existing data sources, gathering and maintaining the data needed, and completing and reviewing the collection of information. HUD may not collect this information, and respondents are not required to complete this form, unless it displays a currently valid OMB Control Number.
